COMPREHENSIVE PERFORMANCE SELF ASSESSMENT

PRIORITIES

The main areas have been:-

- Supporting and protecting vulnerable adults, young people and children
- Helping to reduce crime and fear of crime
- Helping to improve the health of local people and make County Durham a safer place

AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT

- Enhancing support for children in care, including the review of child protection cases, better health care assessment, providing personal education plans, improving educational attainment and increasing the level of adoption, the latter two being LPSA targets
- Achieving stability in the residential and nursing care market through agreeing payment rates and arrangements for regular review
- Developing whole systems approach to intermediate care services, including improving hospital discharge arrangements
- Better use of community buildings and compliance with DDA access requirements; and
- Improving road safety in relation to child deaths and casualties, which is the focus of one of the LPSA targets.

IMPROVEMENT PLANNING PRIORITIES FOLLOWING CPA

- Focus on services for older people (Service priority)
- Further development of support for LSPs, looking to increase community engagement and involvement to improve the capacity of communities to participate in democratic and service delivery processes (Corporate priority).
