A scrutiny Report about Alcohol and Drug Misuse by Young People in County Durham

Health Scrutiny Sub-Committee 14 May 2007

Response from County Durham DAAT Partnership Board

County Durham DAAT welcomes the report by the Health Scrutiny Sub-Committee into the issues concerning young people regarding alcohol and drugs. It is a comprehensive overview of the situation facing young people in County Durham. The DAAT Board recognises the conclusion that the Sub-Committee has reached with regard to the size of the problem caused by alcohol as opposed to drugs in the lives of young people. This is not to down play the risks associated with drugs, but the scale of the problem associated with the much more readily available, culturally acceptable product—alcohol is more pervasive.

County Durham DAAT Board refocused the business of the DAAT Unit at its board meeting in November 2006. The Board supported the need for the DAAT Unit to become a commissioning body —not a hybrid of commissioning and providing. Here the Board emphasised the need for a focus on alcohol within County Durham which had not been there in the past. Subsequent to this the DAAT Unit received funding from County Durham PCT to be used in the development of an Alcohol Commissioner post to complement the existing Commissioning Manger post focused solely on substance misuse issues.

Therefore during the life of the Sub-Committee's investigation one of the main organisations referenced in the report has changed the focus of its activity. In many ways these changes mirror the recommendations made within the report and feel that the sub-committee will be pleased with the progress being made.

However, whilst there are some significant achievements to be recorded in the action plan (attached) it is worthwhile drawing to the attention of the Sub-Committee some of the inflexibilities of the funding streams associated with substance misuse and alcohol. The DAAT Unit is allocated approximately £4.5m to address adult substance misuse issues across all four tiers—awareness raising through to rehabilitation from the National Treatment Agency. It is allocated £550k by the Home Office to address young people's issues across the four tiers. This is a significant reduction on last years budget and must be spent within year. The DAAT Unit also receives other specifically allocated money, most noticeably £500k allocated from the Home Office for the Drug Intervention Programme. Details of 2008/09 funding arrangement are still awaited.

This highlights the scale of funds available to young people's development compared to adult service development to the DAAT. This is in conjunction with the fact that money allocated to substance misuse from National Government Departments cannot be used on the development of alcohol services. The DAAT Unit in this regard is fortunate to be in receipt of significant alcohol funding to develop local services via County Durham PCTs Local Delivery Plan process and Neighbourhood Renewal Fund. Durham is also fortunate that since the changes to the DAAT Board and DAAT Unit from November 2006 partners in Durham are able to consider aligning elements of their main stream budgets to support the direction of travel the DAAT Board has set.
