1 Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Councillor E Waldock.

2 Substitute Members

There were no substitute Members.

3 Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest.

4 Minutes

The Minutes of the meeting held on 31 October 2022 were agreed as a correct record and were signed by the Chair.

5 Application to Review the Club Premises Certificate - The Tythe Barn, The Hallgarth, Durham

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and introductions were made. It was noted that four Sub-Committee Members were present to hear the application however only three Members were required to make the decision. The Council's Solicitor then outlined the procedure for the hearing.

The Licensing Team Leader presented a report of the Corporate Director of Neighbourhoods and Climate Change, for the application to review the club premises certificate for The Tythe Barn (Durham Prison Officers Club), The Hallgarth, Durham (for copy of report, see file of minutes).

The Licensing Team Leader indicated that both parties had mediated and agreed to the conditions as outlined at Appendix 4 of the report, that would be appropriate to resolve the issues set out in the review application.

During the consultation period no representations had been received in support of the review application. Durham Constabulary, the Fire Safety Authority and the Planning Authority had all responded to the consultation with no representations.

With no questions being asked from Members or either parties, at 9.40 am Councillors L Brown, E Peeke and R Adcock-Forster **Resolved** to retire to deliberate the application in private. After re-convening at 9.50 am, the Chair delivered the Sub-Committee's decision. In reaching their decision the Sub-Committee considered the report of the Corporate Director of Neighbourhoods and Climate Change, together with the written representations from the Applicant and the Club Premises Certificate Holder. Members also took into account the Councils Statement of Licensing Policy and Section 182 Guidance issued by the Secretary of State.

Resolved:

That the following conditions agreed between the parties be added to the existing Club Premises Certificate:

- 1. Ensure all doors and windows serving the main hall are kept shut whilst recorded or live music played at a level likely to be audible at residential properties.
- 2. Live or recorded music within the venue shall not be played at a level in excess of 90dBA LAeq (5 mins) at a position no more than 2m from the forward facing speaker position. A measurement shall be taken every hour and the results recorded and provided at the request of Durham County Councils Environmental Health Team. Bass type noise shall be minimised, and checks will be undertaken to ensure it is not intrusive at the nearest noise sensitive receptors. On the instruction of Durham County Councils Environmental Health Team, following receipt of a valid complaint and completion of an appropriate investigation, a noise impact assessment will be undertaken and a noise limiter provided to ensure that the break out of music noise is managed.
- 3. The beer garden to the front of the premises shall only be used between the hours of 10am-9pm Sunday, Thursday and 10am-10pm Friday-Saturday. Whilst the beer garden is in use, regular checks shall be carried out to ensure behaviour of patrons does not lead to a noise level likely to be intrusive to residential properties.

Purpose of the Report

- The Sub-Committee is asked to consider and determine the application for the variation of a premises licence for Blue Eye, 25 Elvet Bridge, Durham City, Durham DH1 3AA.
- 2 A plan showing the location of the premises is attached at Appendix 2.

Executive summary

- The application requests the granting of a variation of a Premises Licence for Blue Eye, 25 Elvet Bridge, Durham City, Durham DH1 3AA.
- 4 The application initially requested the following activities:

To increase timings for all existing licensable activities, namely recorded music (indoors) and sale of alcohol (on sales only). Alongside the amendment of an existing condition.

5 **Mediation**

Within the consultation period Durham Constabulary communicated with the applicant's solicitor and an amendment to the application was submitted to cease sale of alcohol at 01:30 hrs and close the premises at 02:00 hrs. Recorded music (indoors) would remain as proposed at 02:00 hrs. Durham Constabulary confirmed following this amendment no objection would be submitted to the variation application.

- The licensing authority received responses from Durham County Council Planning Department, (this was forwarded to the Applicant for information) and no comment responses from Public Health, Durham Safeguarding Children Partnership and County Durham & Darlington Fire and Rescue Service.
- 7 The licensing authority received one letter in opposition to the application from City of Durham Parish Council (other persons).

Recommendation(s)

- The Sub-Committee is asked to determine the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.
- 9 The Sub-Committee is recommended to give appropriate weight to:
 - (a) The steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
 - (b) The representations (including supporting information) presented by all parties;
 - (c) The Durham County Council Statement of Licensing Policy. The relevant parts of the policy are attached at Appendix 6;
 - (d) The Guidance issued to local authorities under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (as amended December 2022). The relevant parts of the guidance are attached at Appendix 7.

 - (b) Grant the variation of the licence subject to modified conditions to that of the operating schedule where the committee considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and the mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003;
 - (c) To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - (d) To refuse to specify a person on the licence as the Designated Premises Supervisor;
 - (e) To reject the application.

Appendix 1: Implications

Legal Implications

The case of Daniel Thwaites Plc v Wirral Borough Magistrates' Court (Case No: CO/5533/2006) at the High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division Administrative Court on 6 May 2008, [2008] EWHC 838 (Admin), 2008 WL 1968943, Before the Honourable Mrs Justice Black.

In this case it was summed up that:

A licensing authority must have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. Licensing authorities may depart from it if they have reason to do so but will need to give full reasons for their actions.

Furthermore the Thwaites case established that only conditions should be attached to a licence with a view to promoting the Licensing objectives and that 'real evidence' must be presented to support the reason for imposing these conditions.

This judgement is further supported in the case of The Queen on the Application of Bristol Council v Bristol Magistrates' Court, CO/6920/2008 High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division The Administrative Court, 24 February 2009, [2009] EWHC 625 (Admin) 2009 WL648859 in which it was said:

'Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for licensing objectives'.

In addition to this, it was stated that any condition attached to the licence should be an enforceable condition.

Consultation

The premises licence application was subject to a 28 day consultation in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 and its regulations.


The Responsible Authorities were consulted on the application.

NOTES ON REGULATED ENTERTAINMENT

In terms of specific **regulated entertainments** please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman
 wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not
 exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or
 wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an
 indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.

 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when no designated premises supervisor has been specified in the licence or at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his or her licence has been suspended. Every supply of alcohol under this premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -

- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to -
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol -

The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either-

- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

The responsible person must ensure that -

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Minimum Price of Alcohol:

- 1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2 For the purposes of the condition:
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D + (DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 3 Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4 (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Mandatory condition: door supervision

1. Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals

must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, the licence must include a condition that each such individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

- 2. But nothing in subsection (1) requires such a condition to be imposed-
 - (a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c.12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or
 - (b) in respect of premises in relation to-
 - (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
 - (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).
- 3. For the purposes of this section-
 - (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and
 - (b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

The Prevention of Crime & Disorder

- 1. Initial staff training will be carried out by the DPS or approved member of staff to ensure no alcohol is sold to anyone under the age of 18. Refresher training will be carried out every 6 months
- 2. Training records to be kept and maintained for every member of staff and endorsed after every training session. The records will be made available to officers and responsible authorities when requested to do so
- 3. CCTV cameras should be positioned internally and externally to cover all entrances and exits to the premises used by the public. A camera should also be placed to cover the area where the sale of alcohol, to customers, occurs
- 4. The CCTV equipment must:
- be maintained in good working order
- show the correct time and date
- provide footage showing details for evidence of identity i.e. facial / the overall view of the scene and; be kept for a period of 28 days
- 5. The CCTV system shall incorporate a battery backup system to enable 24 hour continuous recording in case of any power blackout / failure
- 6. The premises licence holder must ensure there is the DPS or appointed member of staff available on the premises who is capable and competent in using the CCTV system. This to include the showing and downloading of the footage onto a disc, hard drive or memory stick when requested by the police / or local authority officer
- 7. The recording equipment including any discs / memory sticks shall be securely to prevent unauthorised access and under the control of a responsible named individual
- 8. A weekly log must be maintained and endorsed by a signature indicating the CCTV system / equipment has been checked and continues to be compliant. Where there are any failings of the system, these must be recorded stating any actions taken
- 9. Door supervisors will be used at the premises from 8.00pm until the premises closes on a Friday, Saturday, Sundays proceeding a Bank Holiday and Bank Holidays
- 10. There will be at least one door supervisor situated on the second floor of the premises when this is being used for any licensable activities
- 11. A log must be kept and maintained on the premises at all times which documents the following information relating to each door supervisor:
- · full name including any middle names
- · date of birth
- SIA badge number
- contact phone number
- security company name
- start and finish times at the premises

Public Safety

- 1. All fire exits and fire safety equipment will be clearly marked and maintained at all times
- 2. All staff to be aware of their requirements regarding health and safety

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





New extract duct taken onto flat roof and connected to Helios

With reference to the above licensing application, the City of Durham Parish Council wishes to object to this proposal under the objective of preventing a public nuisance.

It is the expectation of the Licensing Authority that, when preparing an operating schedule, applicants are required to set out the steps necessary, if any, for the promotion of the licensing objectives. In doing so, applicants are expected to have regard to the Statement of Licensing Policy and to be aware of the expectations of the licensing authority and responsible authorities in terms of the steps that are necessary to promote the licensing objectives.

The Parish Council Planning and Licensing Committee considered this application at its meeting on 9th December 2022. In reaching its decision, the Parish Council Planning and Licensing Committee had regard to the Licensing Act 2003, the Section 182 Guidance and the County Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2019 to 2024. The Parish Council Planning and Licensing Committee feels that, should this application be granted in its current form, it will fail to uphold this important licensing objective.

Preventing a public nuisance

The prevention of public nuisance is an important licensing objective. Two of the greatest irritations to residents are noise and public nuisance associated with licensed premises. If representations are made, noise and nuisance might preclude the grant of a licence or certificate or, if one has already been granted, could be a ground for review, with a view to the imposition of further conditions or, if the licensing objectives cannot be achieved by such conditions, revocation of the licence or certificate.

When dealing with applications and issuing licences, the Council (when their discretion is engaged) is more likely to impose stricter conditions on premises operating in residential areas.

Proper consideration should therefore be given to the proximity of licensed premises not only to residents and businesses, but also in relation to other sensitive premises, to ensure they are in a position that does not adversely affect their ability to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives. Appendix A below sets out a list of residential properties within approximately 100 metres of this site and serves to highlight the level of residential uses within the vicinity of this premises.

This variation application seeks permission to a) extend the sale of alcohol hours (on sales) Monday to Sunday to 2.00am, b) extend the hours for recorded music Monday to Sunday to 2.00am, c) extend opening hours to 2.30am Monday to Sunday and d) amend a condition on the operating schedule to read: "no persons under the age of 18 will be allowed access to the premises after 9.00pm".

At present, the premises has a license for the sale of alcohol and the playing of recorded music Monday to Sunday to 1.00am and closes at 1.30am. As such, this premises is already operating outside Durham County Council's Licensing Framework hours for this category of premises on weekdays (i.e. "premises licensed for the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on or off the premises e.g. pubs, social clubs and nightclubs" which are 07.00 to 00.00 weekdays and 07.00 to 01.00 on weekends) and approval of this variation would further push the hours of licensable activities beyond the framework.

Moreover, this premises gained planning permission for its current use as a drinking establishment on 19th October 2018. Condition 3 of this approval is set out as follows:

Condition 3: The hours of operation shall be limited to be between 8am and midnight 7 days a week.

Reason: To reflect the hours agreed with the applicant on the 17th October 2018 to protect the residential amenity of the area in accordance with Policy H13 of the City of Durham Local Plan 2004 and promote safe communities in accordance with Part 8 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

At present, this premises is operating outside the hours restricted by its planning approval. Clearly the issue of residential amenity was a concern to the Council in 2018, such that the hours of operation were limited to those set out at Condition 3 of the planning approval and both the Environmental Health team and the Police both insisted on a midnight closing time in 2018 accordingly. This premises should conform with these conditions, particularly given its proximity to residential accommodation.

The Parish Council is unclear as to why the applicant is requesting permission for the additional hours for this premises. This is not only in conflict with the County Council's Licensing Framework hours, the planning conditions for this premises but also the resident led "Shh...11pm-7am" campaign. This application causes real concern regarding the potential of a public nuisance in the form of late-night noise to local residents. Durham is a small, compact city centre with many residential streets in very close proximity to one another. The

Parish Council believes that full consideration should be given to the risk of disturbance to residents. As such, the Parish Council objects to this license and its proposed operating hours in the interests of preventing a public nuisance.

This application should be refused in its present form.

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Appendix 6: Statement of Licensing Policy

7.3 Prevention of Public Nuisance - Licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning, can cause a range of nuisances impacting on people living, working or sleeping near the premises.

The concerns relate, amongst other things, to litter, light pollution, noxious odours and noise nuisance resulting from music, human voices, ventilation equipment and vehicles. The **council will expect** applicants to demonstrate that suitable and sufficient measures have been identified, and will be implemented and maintained, with the intention of preventing public nuisance relevant to the individual style, location and characteristics of the premises and events.

If an external structure or area is to be used by customers, whether for consumption of alcohol or for smoking, the **applicant will be expected** to offer measures designed to minimise its impact on residents in respect of both public nuisance and crime and disorder. These measures may include a restriction on hours that areas / structures will be used or appropriate signage requesting customers to consider residents and monitoring of such areas by staff.

The placement of tables and chairs outside of licensed premises may give rise to public nuisance including noise and litter. When tables and chairs are situated on the public highway, relevant authorisations will often be required from the Highways Authority. Enquiries concerning such consents should be made to the Council's Highway's Section (see Appendix III). In predominantly commercial areas, such as shopping centres, the use of tables and chairs outside may be allowed however, the **council will normally expect** them to be removed before the premises close, and any resulting litter/debris cleared away.

Applicants should consider reducing potential noise nuisance by, for example (this list is not exhaustive):

- Assessment of likely noise levels in the premises
- Assessment of likely noise levels if outdoor drinking is allowed
- The sound insulation the building would provide (e.g. double glazing, double doors / lobbies to entrances, windows used for ventilation)
- The distance and direction to the nearest noise sensitive premises.
- Likely noise sources outside of the premises (e.g. emptying bottle bins, taxis, unruly customers leaving the premises)
- Dispersal of patrons where necessary the council will expect a dispersal policy for patrons at the end of the evening. The policy will specify such issues as alterations to the style and volume of music played, public address announcements and use of appropriate signage at exits
- Ways to limit noise / disorder from patrons leaving the premises

The extent to which the above matters will need to be addressed will be dependent on the nature of the area where the premises are situated, the type of premises concerned, the licensable activities to be provided, operational procedures and the needs of the local community.

Applicants are advised to seek advice from Durham County Council's Environmental Health team and incorporate any recommendations in their operating schedule before submitting their applications.

Takeaways and fast-food outlets - The council expects takeaways and latenight refreshment premises to take reasonable steps in clearing litter from outside their premises and along the pavement in either direction as necessary, whilst the premises are open and at the end of the working day. These premises should maintain clean, dirt or grease free frontages. Such premises should also display notices advising customers of the location of bins and patrons should be encouraged to use the bins made available.

<u>Important note:</u> The council considers that it will be inappropriate to grant a premises licence permitting the sale of alcohol at premises which are principally used for selling hot food for consumption off the premises ("takeaway" premises).

Takeaway premises are often open late at night and in the early hours of the morning. They can be associated with disorder as people under the influence of alcohol may congregate outside takeaways after leaving or in some cases having been ejected from late-night licensed premises.

Takeaways operate within the night time economy but without the same framework around them, e.g. pubwatch, use of security staff etc. In addition, alcohol sold from takeaways could readily be consumed in public spaces and may not be subject to the same controls associated with other types of licensed premises.

From a health perspective, obesity levels are rising nationally and locally; without action the health of the population will continue to suffer. Responsible licensees can support the 'Working toward a healthy weight in County Durham' goals and the council would see the following steps as a contribution to reducing health harms and health inequalities:

- Menu to display calories per portion information for all food offers.
- Menu to offer at least one clear and stated, 'healthy option' and to be priced competitively.
- Menu to display recommended daily calorie limits for adults (For women the recommended limit is 2,000 calories a day for men it's 2,500).
- Menu to offer smaller / half portions.
- Salt and pepper available upon request rather than always on the table

In addition to the information provided above, **Table 3 in Appendix IV** provides recommendations, suggestions and examples of how to prevent the specific nuisance type outlined. This table is not exhaustive, and every applicant must consider the specific situation, location and circumstances associated with their premises, activities, clientele and workforce when identifying hazards, assessing risks and identifying controls.

Appendix 7: Section 182 Guidance

Public nuisance

- 2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- 2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 2.17 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 16). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.
- 2.18 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.
- 2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive

period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.

- 2.20 Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises which is considered appropriate to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues.
- 2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in antisocial behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.
