Purpose of the Report

1 The Sub-Committee is asked to consider and determine the application for the grant of a Premises Licence for Hidden on the Harbour, 4 North Terrace, Seaham, SR7 7EU. A plan showing the location of the premises is attached at Appendix 2.

Executive summary

- 2 The application requests the granting of a new Premises Licence which was submitted to the Licensing Authority on 6th April 2023 by Mr Michael Downey.
- 3 The application originally requested the following activity:
 - Live and Recorded Music (Indoors) Sunday to Thursday from 23:00 hrs – 00:00 hrs and Friday to Saturday 23:00 hrs – 01:00 hrs. Boxing Day, New Year's Eve and Sundays preceding a Bank Holiday Monday from 23:00 hrs – 01:00 hrs.
 - Late Night Refreshment (Indoors) Sunday to Thursday from 23:00 hrs – 00:00 hrs and Friday to Saturday 23:00 hrs – 01:00 hrs Boxing Day, New Year's Eve and Sundays preceding a Bank Holiday Monday from 23:00 hrs – 01:00 hrs.
 - Sale by retail of alcohol (On the Premises) Sunday to Thursday from 08:00 hrs – 00:00 hrs and Friday to Saturday 08:00 hrs – 01:00 hrs. Boxing Day, New Year's Eve and Sundays preceding a Bank Holiday Monday from 08:00 hrs – 01:00 hrs.

Opening Hours from Sunday to Thursday from 08:00 hrs - 00:00 hrsand Friday to Saturday 08:00 hrs - 01:00 hrs. Boxing Day, New Year's Eve and Sundays preceding a Bank Holiday Monday from 08:00 hrs - 01:00 hrs.

- 4 During the consultation period, the Licensing Authority received three objections to the application from other persons, namely Ms Aylott, Mr Mongan and Ms Maddox.
- 5 Responses were received from Durham County Council's Environmental Health, the Durham Safeguarding Children Partnership, County Durham and Darlington Fire Safety Authority and Durham Constabulary all confirming they had no comments to make regarding the application.
- 6 Following mediation, the applicant agreed to amend the activities to the following:
 - Live Music (Indoors) Removed this activity as now deregulated Monday to Sunday - Non-standard timings to remain
 - Recorded Music (Indoors) Removed this activity Monday to Thursday as now deregulated - Non-standard timings to remain
 - Recorded Music (Indoors) Sunday 23:00 hrs 23:30 hrs Non-standard timings to remain
 - Sale by retail of alcohol (On the premises) Monday to Thursday from 11:00 hrs – 23:00 hrs Friday to Saturday 11:00 hrs – 01:00 hrs Sunday 11:00 hrs – 23:30 hrs Non-standard timings to remain
 - Late Night Refreshment (Indoors) Removed this activity Monday to Sunday - Non-standard timings to remain

For Members information: Live and recorded music in licensed premises is deregulated (not licensable) between 8.00 hrs and 23.00 hrs when alcohol is being sold and there are less than 500 persons present.

7 Following the amendments by the applicant, Ms Aylott and Mr Mongan withdrew their representations.

Details of the application

- 11 An application for the grant of a new Premises Licence was received by the Licensing Authority on 6th April 2023. A copy of the application and subsequent amendments are attached at Appendix 3.
- 12 The application is deemed by the Licensing Authority to be correctly served and advertised in accordance with the Licensing Act regulations.
- 13 The applicant has proposed the conditions and steps that they intend to take in order to promote the four licensing objectives, which are outlined within the application's Operating Schedule.

Options

- 19 There are a number of options open to the Sub-Committee:
 - (a) Grant the licence subject to conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application and the mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003;
 - (b) Grant the licence subject to modified conditions to that of the operating schedule where the committee considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and the mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003;
 - (c) To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - (d) To refuse to specify a person on the licence as the Designated Premises Supervisor;
 - (e) To reject the application.

Appendix 1: Implications

Legal Implications

The case of Daniel Thwaites Plc v Wirral Borough Magistrates' Court (Case No: CO/5533/2006) at the High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division Administrative Court on 6 May 2008, [2008] EWHC 838 (Admin), 2008 WL 1968943, Before the Honourable Mrs Justice Black.

In this case it was summed up that:

A licensing authority must have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. Licensing authorities may depart from it if they have reason to do so but will need to give full reasons for their actions.

Furthermore the Thwaites case established that only conditions should be attached to a licence with a view to promoting the Licensing objectives and that 'real evidence' must be presented to support the reason for imposing these conditions.

This judgement is further supported in the case of The Queen on the Application of Bristol Council v Bristol Magistrates' Court, CO/6920/2008 High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division The Administrative Court, 24 February 2009, [2009] EWHC 625 (Admin) 2009 WL648859 in which it was said:

'Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for licensing objectives'.

In addition to this, it was stated that any condition attached to the licence should be an enforceable condition.

Consultation

The premises licence application was subject to a 28 day consultation in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 and its regulations.


The Responsible Authorities were consulted on the application.



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M Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d, e) (please read guidance note 10)

The Licensee, that is the person in whose name the premises licence is issued, shall ensure that all times when the premises are for any licensable activity, there are sufficient competent staff on duty at the premises for the purpose of fulfilling the terms and conditions of the licence and for preventing crime and disorder. The Licensee shall ensure that all staff will undertake training in their responsibilities in relation to the sale of alcohol, particularly with regard to drunkenness and underage persons. Records will be kept of training and refresher training.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Any incidents of a criminal nature that may occur on the premises will be reported to the Police.

The Licensee will install comprehensive CCTV coverage at the premises and it is operated and maintained at the premises.

The CCTV system shall conform to the following points:

1. Cameras must be sited to observe the entrance and exit doors both inside and outside.

2. Cameras on the entrances must capture full frame shots of the heads and shoulders of all people entering the premises i.e. capable of identification.

3. Cameras viewing till areas must capture frames not less than 50% of screen.

4. Cameras overlooking floor areas should be wide angled to give an overview of the premises.

- 5. Be capable of visually confirming the nature of the crime committed.
- 6. Provide a linked record of the date, time and place of any image.
- 7. Provide good quality images –colour during opening times.
- 8. Operate under existing light levels within and outside the premises.
- 9. Have the recording device located in a secure area or locked cabinet.

10. Have a monitor to review images and recorded picture quality.

- 11. Be regularly maintained to ensure continuous quality of image capture retention.
- 12. Have signage displayed in the customer area to advise that CCTV is in operation.
- 13. Digital images must be kept for 31 days.
- 14. Police will have access to images at any reasonable time.

15. The equipment must have a suitable export method, e. G. CD/DVD writer so that the police can make an evidential copy of the data they require. This data should be in the native file format, to ensure that no image quality is lost when making the copy, if this format is non-standard (i.e. manufacturer proprietary) then the manufacturer should supply the replay software to ensure that the video on the CD can be replayed by the police on a standard computer. Copies must be made available to Police on request.

c) Public safety

Appropriate fire safety procedures are in place including fire extinguishers (foam, H2O and CO2), fire blanket, internally illuminated fire exit signs, numerous smoke detectors and emergency lighting (see enclosed plan for details of locations). All appliances are inspected annually.

All emergency exits shall be kept free from obstruction at all times.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

All customers will be asked to leave quietly. Clear and legible notices will be prominently displayed to remind customers to leave quietly and have regard to our neighbours.

e) The protection of children from harm

The licensee and staff will ask persons who appear to be under the age of 25 for photographic ID such as proof of age cards, the Connexions Card and Citizen Card, photographic driving licence or passport, an official identity card issued by HM Forces or by an EU country, bearing the photograph and date of birth of bearer.

All staff will be trained for UNDERAGE SALES PREVENTION regularly.

A register of refused sales shall be kept and maintained on the premises.





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Additional Information from Applicant

To whom it may concern,

I am writing this email to give anyone reading a better idea of who I am, how my company is run and my intention for 4 North Terrace, Seaham. As a family, the Downey's have had numerous businesses around the North East in the hospitality and food industry. My father Michael Downey SNR has been in the business for over 60 years and is still now working in the industry as Downey's fish shops. As an individual, I have been in the leisure industry from the age of 15 working in both family companies and others, working my way up in all kinds of job roles including: food running, bar, security and management so I have a wealth of experience and passion for the sector. As a businessman, I branched out on my own 17 years ago and have invested my time and finances in bars, nightclubs, restaurants and cafes in Sunderland and I am extremely enthusiastic about launching this new venture 'Hidden on the harbour – bar and bistro' in Seaham which has been in the works since 2018.

My wife and I had a few businesses that we lost due to the Covid and coming out of the pandemic, the only business we had left was the 'Keel lounge' café bistro on the High Street in Sunderland which is a very popular venue having been there over 5 years with a 5* food hygiene rating and the vacant property 'Wishing Well' (4 North Terrace). Since coming out of lockdown, we have opened Hidden cocktail bar / roof terrace and Trilogy in an iconic building in Sunderland city centre, the Galen building.

The premises, formally known as 'The wishing well' was taken over by my wife and I 5 years ago. At the time, it held an alcohol licence. Due to a heart-attack in Feb 2020, I was unable to proceed with the redecoration and rebuild inside. Now that I am in better health, I am able to complete this project which has been in the works since 2018. Despite not being eligible for any grants from the government as we were not open, we persevered to hold onto the venue as we believed in the vision we had and I am happy to report, we are almost over the finishing line after we have meeting our contractual rent agreements (even through the pandemic) and have completely renovated the inside of 4 North Terrace, formally the 'Wishing Well' at a very high quality so that we compliment neighbouring businesses such as: The Lamp rooms, Clean Bean etc and will bring additional employment of around 15-20 people to the area as well as giving the residents and visitors to Seaham another attraction to the seafront.

We have added a lobby to the venue with an extra set of doors to alleviate any sound bleed from the premises. Previously, the Wishing Well venue had a 1.00am licence which is what we are applying for and is also what neighbouring venues have on North Terrace. Although it may not be required and we won't know how trade is until we open, we intend to be open 7 days a week as a bar bistro with a full food menu serving both alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages including craft ales and cocktails and would be open later on weekends than weekdays as you'd expect. In this scenario, we would of course use our SIA registered security personnel to ensure the safety of customers and the wider public was the top priority. Before we open the premises, we would train all staff members in the licencing objectives and would ensure there is always personal licence holder on the premises during opening hours.

We have had a kitchen put in so we can now sell food which was never done at the property previously. The premises going forward will be known as 'Hidden on the Harbour – bar and bistro.' We have another brand, Tequila Tequila Mexican which will feature in some dishes on the menu. We are intending on offering Mon – Sat table service with meals and Sunday lunches, Friday and Saturday evenings tapas will be served das well as: fine wines, cocktails, ales and craft beers. We will be operating challenge 25 and a strictly over 21 policy from 7.00pm which proved to be extremely positively received in our Hidden Sunderland venue which in turn, attracted a more mature and sensible clientele.

I am confident that this venue will be an asset to the Seaham seafront and wider community and would encourage local residents to come and see how we have transformed and improved the venue, offering a vibrant new lease of life to a premises which has stood empty for years. I passionately believe in this project, what we are aiming to achieve and welcome any opportunities to share this in person with anyone who's interested in popping in for a chat. I hope after reading this, it offers more clarity on the direction of the venue and I hope you'd be able to visit us once we open to see the work that has gone into the building.

I wish to make comments regarding the licence application from the new premises called Hidden on the Harbour, Seaham SR7 7EU.

The request by Mr Michael Downey to have his premise serve alcohol until midnight Sunday to Thursday and to 1am on Friday and Saturdays is unacceptable. This is a residential area not a busy town centre. Not only does Mr Downey wish to sell alcohol to the early hours, he wishes to play live and recorded music up to these early hours too.

There are residents immediately next door as well as across the road within metres of the licensed premise. Can you imagine what the noise would be like in the summer months when the premise would have a permanent open door or one being opened and closed every few minutes. Customers of the venue leaving after midnight and after 1am is unfair. Obviously this is a licensed premise and the amount of alcohol consumed would make the revellers louder than usual...which is to be expected.... But yet another reason for the premise to adhere to normal licensing hours of 11pm.

Although I do not live on North Terrace itself, I live on the main road where I can hear people walking past on their way home at night. Quite often, especially Friday and Saturday, I am woken by people being rowdy and shouting as they pass on their way home. This is of course in normal licensing hours and i accept that people will be louder after an evening out but for this to happen after midnight and after 1am is unfair to local residents.

Appendix 6: Statement of Licensing Policy

7.3 Prevention of Public Nuisance - Licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning, can cause a range of nuisances impacting on people living, working or sleeping near the premises.

The concerns relate, amongst other things, to litter, light pollution, noxious odours and noise nuisance resulting from music, human voices, ventilation equipment and vehicles. The **council will expect** applicants to demonstrate that suitable and sufficient measures have been identified, and will be implemented and maintained, with the intention of preventing public nuisance relevant to the individual style, location and characteristics of the premises and events.

If an external structure or area is to be used by customers, whether for consumption of alcohol or for smoking, the **applicant will be expected** to offer measures designed to minimise its impact on residents in respect of both public nuisance and crime and disorder. These measures may include a restriction on hours that areas / structures will be used or appropriate signage requesting customers to consider residents and monitoring of such areas by staff.

The placement of tables and chairs outside of licensed premises may give rise to public nuisance including noise and litter. When tables and chairs are situated on the public highway, relevant authorisations will often be required from the Highways Authority. Enquiries concerning such consents should be made to the Council's Highway's Section (see Appendix III). In predominantly commercial areas, such as shopping centres, the use of tables and chairs outside may be allowed however, the **council will normally expect** them to be removed before the premises close, and any resulting litter/debris cleared away.

Applicants should consider reducing potential noise nuisance by, for example (this list is not exhaustive):

- Assessment of likely noise levels in the premises
- Assessment of likely noise levels if outdoor drinking is allowed
- The sound insulation the building would provide (e.g. double glazing, double doors / lobbies to entrances, windows used for ventilation)
- The distance and direction to the nearest noise sensitive premises.
- Likely noise sources outside of the premises (e.g. emptying bottle bins, taxis, unruly customers leaving the premises)
- Dispersal of patrons where necessary the council will expect a dispersal policy for patrons at the end of the evening. The policy will specify such issues as alterations to the style and volume of music played, public address announcements and use of appropriate signage at exits
- Ways to limit noise / disorder from patrons leaving the premises

The extent to which the above matters will need to be addressed will be dependent on the nature of the area where the premises are situated, the type of premises concerned, the licensable activities to be provided, operational procedures and the needs of the local community.

Applicants are advised to seek advice from Durham County Council's Environmental Health team and incorporate any recommendations in their operating schedule before submitting their applications.

Takeaways and fast-food outlets - The council expects takeaways and latenight refreshment premises to take reasonable steps in clearing litter from outside their premises and along the pavement in either direction as necessary, whilst the premises are open and at the end of the working day. These premises should maintain clean, dirt or grease free frontages. Such premises should also display notices advising customers of the location of bins and patrons should be encouraged to use the bins made available.

<u>Important note:</u> The council considers that it will be inappropriate to grant a premises licence permitting the sale of alcohol at premises which are principally used for selling hot food for consumption off the premises ("takeaway" premises).

Takeaway premises are often open late at night and in the early hours of the morning. They can be associated with disorder as people under the influence of alcohol may congregate outside takeaways after leaving or in some cases having been ejected from late-night licensed premises.

Takeaways operate within the night time economy but without the same framework around them, e.g. pubwatch, use of security staff etc. In addition, alcohol sold from takeaways could readily be consumed in public spaces and may not be subject to the same controls associated with other types of licensed premises.

From a health perspective, obesity levels are rising nationally and locally; without action the health of the population will continue to suffer. Responsible licensees can support the 'Working toward a healthy weight in County Durham' goals and the council would see the following steps as a contribution to reducing health harms and health inequalities:

- Menu to display calories per portion information for all food offers.
- Menu to offer at least one clear and stated, 'healthy option' and to be priced competitively.
- Menu to display recommended daily calorie limits for adults (For women the recommended limit is 2,000 calories a day for men it's 2,500).
- Menu to offer smaller / half portions.
- Salt and pepper available upon request rather than always on the table

In addition to the information provided above, **Table 3 in Appendix IV** provides recommendations, suggestions and examples of how to prevent the specific nuisance type outlined. This table is not exhaustive, and every applicant must consider the specific situation, location and circumstances associated with their premises, activities, clientele and workforce when identifying hazards, assessing risks and identifying controls.

Appendix 7: Section 182 Guidance

Public nuisance

- 2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- 2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 2.17 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 16). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.
- 2.18 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.
- 2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive

period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.

- 2.20 Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises which is considered appropriate to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues.
- 2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in antisocial behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.
