Overview of Early Help Services

Purpose of the Report

This report provides information about the County Durham Early Help Offer, to support the dedicated session at Scrutiny on this topic.

Executive summary

- Early Help is the term used in County Durham to describe our approach to providing support to vulnerable children, young people, and families as soon as problems start to emerge or when there is a strong likelihood that problems will emerge in the future. Some early help support is described as 'targeted early help' and is provided to children and families who are identified by practitioners to have multiple or complex needs, requiring a specialist and/or multi-agency response but where statutory social work intervention is not needed.
- To support Scrutiny with this focused session on Early Help, this brief covering report is accompanied by a detailed slide pack which covers a range of key areas relating to Early Help.
- The accompanying slide pack at Appendix 2 covers:
 - (a) County Durham's Early Help Strategy (2024/26) and Early Help System;
 - (b) National legislation which applies to Early Help and the current Inspection Framework;

Legal Implications

Working Together to Safeguard Children 2023, is the Department for Education Statutory Guidance on multi-agency working to help, protect and promote the welfare of children. This guidance applies to all local authorities.

Finance

There are a range of financial implications relating to Early Help Services. The presentation particularly highlights the current position in relation to future funding confirmed.

Section 19 of the Children and Families Act 2014 makes clear that Local Authorities must ensure that children, young people, parents, and carers are involved in decisions about local provision.
