



More and better jobs in an inclusive, green economy



## Key trends: productivity



Good growth in 2001 and 2022, helping county Durham to converge with regional and national rates.


Growth has been driven by manufacturing and construction, whereas there has been a fall in the productivity of business services (accountants, solicitors, banks, etc).

2023 data is due in the summer.

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## Key trends: employment




The number of the county's residents in work is fluctuating.

However, the accuracy of data is questionable due to the small number of surveys completed in the county.



## Key trends: employment




The County Durham employment rate tends to sit between the NECA and England rates.

Data suggests a decline in 2024; mainly driven by falls in self-employment rather than those 'in jobs'.


This is consistent with data showing a decline in micro-sized businesses (0 to 9 employees) in the county, but the fall is much more pronounced in the employment data.

#### Key trends: long-term sickness



- Data suggests that long-term sickness is increasing in County Durham.
- This data relates to 16 64 year olds who are economically inactive – e.g. out of work and not seeking work.
- This is also a regional and national problem where the proportionate increases have been similar.
- 29,900 residents in the county are out of work due to long-term sickness; representing 27% of those in the NECA area.



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## Summary of delivery

#### People

- DurhamEnable supporting adults with disabilities and mental health challenges into work.
- Durham Learn delivery extended to work with partners to provide flexible courses, internships, for people of all ages.
- Multiply and Communicate programmes launched to support people to gain basic numeracy, literacy and digital skills.
- Regional Adult Skills Fund launched to enable delivery partners to provide free courses that help people to gain jobs.
- Regional skills plans launched to support workforce development in critical industrial sectors.

#### Places

- £25m Towns and Villages Programme.
- Bishop Auckland regeneration.
