Highway Adoptions

Report of Regeneration and Local Services Dave Wafer- Strategic Traffic Manager

Purpose of the Report

To consider those roads and footpaths, etc., which have been built by developers to County Council standards and are now offered for adoption, and those now deemed to be highways under the terms of Section 38/278 Agreements.

Background

The newly constructed highway described below has been offered for adoption.

Sedgefield District

a) Housing Estate Roads at Middlestone Moor, Spennymoor

Taylor Wimpey North East (George Wimpey North Yorkshire Ltd) having made up the undermentioned roads and footpaths at Middlestone Moor, Spennymoor in accordance with the terms of the Section 38/278 Agreement and they are now deemed to be highway maintainable at the public expense effective from 2 July 2018.

C152 Grayson Road

The two visibility splays on the north side of the Road C152, Grayson road, extending both north easterly and south westerly from the junction with Mulberry Way outside Nos 3-10~&~11-19 Everson Way, 95 metres or thereabouts in length.

Mulberry Drive

The access road, parking bays and associated footways commencing from a point on the Road C152 Grayson Road, between Nos 10 & 11 Everson Way, heading in a northerly direction, terminating at a point on the existing adopted highway, adjacent to No 1 Almond Close, 315 metres or thereabouts in length.

Lavender Crescent

The access road and associated footways commencing from a point on the abovementioned access road, adjacent to No 1 Mulberry Drive, heading in a westerly direction before turning to head in a generally north easterly direction, linking back to the abovementioned access road at a point adjacent to No 15 Mulberry Drive, 262 metres or thereabouts in length.

The segregated footpath commencing from a point on the Road C152 Grayson Road, south of No 23 Lavender Crescent, heading in a generally northerly direction, outside of Nos 23 – 41 (odd) Lavender Crescent, continuing in a northerly direction across the abovementioned access road, outside of Nos 14 – 22 (even) Lavender Crescent, terminating at a point on the abovementioned access road, opposite No 61 Lavender Crescent, 197 metres or thereabouts in length.

Snowdrop Close

The access road and associated footways commencing from a point on the aforementioned access road, opposite No 5 Mulberry Drive, heading in a north easterly direction, serving Nos 1-15 Snowdrop Close, 75 metres or thereabouts in length.

Skylark Way

The access road and associated footways commencing from a point on the aforementioned access road, opposite No 16 Mulberry Drive, heading in a westerly direction, serving Nos 1-4 Skylark Way, 73 metres or thereabouts in length.

Charhill Close

The access road and associated footways commencing from a point on the aforementioned access road, opposite No 36 Mulberry Drive, heading in a westerly direction, serving Nos 1-3 (odd) & 2-6 (even) Charhill Close, 42 metres or thereabouts in length.

Skylark Way/Charhill Close

The segregated footpath commencing from a point on the aforementioned access road, adjacent to No 69 Lavender Crescent, heading in a northerly direction before turning to head in a generally north easterly direction outside No 3 Charhill Close, terminating at a point on the aforementioned access road adjacent to No 29 Mulberry Drive, including the two link footpaths west of Nos 3 & 4 Skylark Way, 232 metres or thereabouts in length.

Magnolia Walk

The segregated footpath commencing from a point on the aforementioned access road, outside No 45 Lavender Crescent, heading in a south westerly direction before turning in a north westerly then north easterly direction serving of Nos 6 – 21 Magnolia Way, terminating at a point on the abovementioned footpath opposite No 3 Charhill Close, including the link north of Nos 21 Magnolia Walk and 65 Lavender Crescent, 326 metres or thereabouts in length.
